Dear Friends,

**The Lord is risen
He is risen indeed
Alleluia!**

A very happy Easter to you all

This is the most joyous season of the Christian year and the affirmation that Jesus is risen: the Christ of God, bringing the possibility of new, eternal life to all humankind is the very heart and foundation of our faith.

It was good to celebrate Easter just a few days ago when quite a large group met in the early morning sunshine in Greenbank Garden among the trees laden with blossom and flowers springing into new life and beauty around us. After a very tasty Easter breakfast in Cathcart Castle Golf Club, we continued our Easter celebration in the Church building.

It was good to see such a big congregation, regular worshippers joined by visiting family and friends as well as folks from our parish and round about who were joining us perhaps for the first time.

For me there was also a strong sense of the connection we continue to have with those saints: our dear ones, who have been part of our community of faith and now, departed life on earth, live the eternal life of heaven – still part of the community of faith.

We remember sisters and brothers who have served the Church diligently and faithfully and who have died in recent days and weeks, as well as those who have died longer ago. And we pray the comfort of God's presence for all who mourn.

People will often say after a bereavement or some sort of significant change: '*Life goes on*'.

Of course, this is exactly what our Christian faith declares. Life goes on – for life never ends. Through Christ our Lord, raised to new life at Easter, we are assured that the never-ending love of God keeps us in life eternally, though the form that life takes beyond our death here is yet to be revealed to us.

Life goes on in the church too.

Our Williamwood Showcase event gives us all an opportunity to see and to celebrate all the aspects of our congregational life at Williamwood. But things will only go on – and new things can only be begun – if you come forward and play your part in these. I'm conscious that there are a number of people who do a lot in our congregation: *pillars of the Kirk*, as they might once have been described, but pillars can only take so much of the weight of tasks and responsibility.

In his first letter probably to Church communities throughout Asia Minor in the second half of the first century AD, Peter describes people who are part of the Church not as pillars but as stones. We are all *living stones*: each with a part to play in building up the Church and proclaiming the gospel message to the world around. There are many more people in our congregation who have gifts that they could use, even in a small way, to contribute to the life of the Church and to take some of the weight off the pillars! How could **you** be a living stone in our church community today?

Life goes on – and life changes.

Before very long our Church of Scotland will be meeting in General Assembly (you can follow the proceedings of the Assembly from 18th-24th May on the Church of Scotland website).

There are two very important reports coming to the General Assembly this year: the so-called 'Radical Action Plan' for which the Assembly called at its last meeting and the report of a Special Commission set up to recommend structural reforms in the Church. Together these have the potential to change the shape of our church and the way it conducts its business and mission very radically indeed.

These reports come against a background of diminishing numbers of full-time Ministers of Word and Sacrament and increasing numbers of buildings that are far from full on a Sunday (or any other day) and may be in need of considerable investment to maintain or reach a satisfactory standard.

One suggestion is that a 'growth fund' is established with several million pounds going into it. Congregations would be able to apply to this to fund the ministry and mission they want to carry out with successful congregations likely to be ones where the whole people are involved in the work of the Church in some way and where they are doing new things to connect with communities and with the under 40 age group in particular. Congregations are unlikely to be successful in securing funding – and perhaps even their future – if they simply want to maintain an increasingly unsustainable model of what being the Church looks like.

It's worth reflecting, even now, on what that might mean for our congregation of Williamwood and how we might change and develop to ensure that we continue to carry out the work of the church; the building of God's kingdom, in and from this place.

In the approaching summer time, we enter a new phase of our congregation's life and you'll see elsewhere details of some of the things that are taking place including our Summer Concert Series for Sunday evenings back by popular demand. Work in the garden and grounds and in the Church building continues and we are grateful to all who take part in this necessary work. I hope everyone will also have a chance to relax, refresh and enjoy the summer sunshine wherever you can find it! Maybe it will also be a time when you can reflect on whether communicant membership of the Church is for you right now – or whether there is some Church work you might become involved with in the new session in August/September.

In this spring-time and throughout the summer season may you know the fullness and joy of life that is the gift of Christ our Lord, risen at Easter and with us always, bringing life ever new.

Lodging House Mission

As you read this we will have come through Lent and celebrated Easter again for another year. Many enjoyed the Clarkston Churches Together Lenten Study which was put together by Christian Churches Together in Britain and Ireland and explored 'The Mystery of God'. Regardless of whether you were able to participate or not Lent is a time for a period of reflection in our lives of faith. Some people traditionally gave up something for Lent but more recently there has been a trend for taking something up instead. Reflection and contemplation is a great thing to do but as James put it: "For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead." This does not, as some thought, contradict the concept of justification by faith alone but merely points out that a genuine faith will inevitably led to some form of action.

Williamwood has had a long tradition of supporting the Lodging House Mission and this is one example of where peoples faith has led to a practical application. We have received more regular updates recently since our Probationary Minister Fergus has been working there on a Wednesday doing general volunteering and offering a weekly Bible Study and Prayer Group. In addition we recently heard from Gus Smeaton, the manager at the LHM who gave us an update on the work that is done there. As a consequence of an appeal made at their Annual General Meeting Williamwood Church now has a band of 12 volunteers who have indicated their willingness to put their faith into action by helping to serve food on a Saturday once or twice a year. Numerous churches in Glasgow support the Mission in this way but many hands make light work. The existing rota is presently running up till the 24th August but we have been assured that Williamwood will be invited to help out as soon as the new rota is created. We look forward to our volunteers sharing their

experiences and allowing our existing relationship with the Mission to develop and grow.

Dear Williamwood Friends,

This is a strange time. It seems no time at all since I wrote an article introducing myself to you and yet, at the same time, it seems like I have been at Williamwood for ages. This is definitely due to the warmth and friendship that I have received since arriving as your Probationary Minister on 1st September 2018.



Having recently had my Interim Review, I thought it might be appropriate to update you all on my progress to becoming an Ordained Minister and share some reflections. If all goes well, and with God's good grace, I am almost on the home straight. After beginning the process by attending a Vocations Conference in February 2014 the end is in sight. Although there is another Conference and an essay on Church Law to complete (training is such fun!) I am now scheduled to have my Final Review in August this year. As I said, all being well, I will then be allowed to apply for a role as a Full Time Minister of Word and Sacrament from 1st September. I am however still with you till 30th November giving me three months to find a position.

As you can imagine the decision on where to apply is a big one. Particularly so, as the role to which I believe I will be called may not yet be advertised, vacant or even created yet! How then will I attempt to discern where I am called? A number of Sunday's ago I explored with you the idea that all Christians are called by God. They may not be called to be ministers, or elders or any other specific position but we are all, I believe, called to live out our faith in different ways. Sometimes trying to decide or discern what that way is can be a problem.

When I was attempting to discern whether or not I was being called to try to become a minister I read an excellent article on the subject of discernment. It was written by the Rev Prof David Ferguson from New College in Edinburgh and appeared in Life and Work, the magazine of the Church of Scotland. In précis, when attempting to discern God's will for us, he suggest three things to examine and consider. Firstly he suggests looking to God through prayer and worship. We should do this regularly and actively listen to what is being said to us, as an individual, through sermons, prayers and scripture. Secondly, he suggests we consider looking inwards. What are we good at? Where do our interests lie? These things are generally things that we enjoy doing and it may well be that we are given a particular gift or talent because we are expected to use it for God. Thirdly, he suggests the counsel of others. Whilst this can be the opinions of family and friends it also includes a far wider circle and would even include a casual conversation with a stranger.

In all cases, we should try to be alert for what God is saying to us in any given situation. I know I shall be listening especially hard over the next six months as I attempt to find my next move.

New Boilers

As you will be aware the new boilers and system upgrade was completed last year and we are now beginning to obtain benefits from both a comfort, control and financial perspective.

The overall cost to date has been £65,650 with a grant of £30,000 from East Renfrewshire Renewable Energy Fund assisting with meeting this necessary Capital Expenditure. While this cost has been met in full, from an accounting perspective, the Finance Committee have decided to leave the Boiler Fund in a deficit position of £27,965 and clear this over an extended period of time. Our annual budget allows for an element of reduction and the Finance Committee will explore other options to effect clearance.

While it is not the intention to have a specific campaign to raise funds should any members wish to contribute to help reduce this deficit please speak to Robert Coulter, Grant Keyes or any other member of the Finance Committee.

Dear All,

As I type, we are into April, and the school holidays have made our normal meetings a bit of stop and start, but before the holidays it was all go.

I last reported in Inspire, that we were doing well in the Nationals, with teams reaching the advanced stages in the Badminton, Chess and Masterteam. In the Chess the boys were into the last four, one match away from the UK finals, but came up against one of last year's finalists from Cumbernauld and narrowly missed out on being Scotland's representatives. It would be a similar story in the Badminton, again one match away from a trip to Northern Ireland, ironically, we possibly travelled further / longer to play in our last match having been drawn away to Inverness. The four hour drive on a Friday afternoon (with the return home the same night) possibly took its toll on our boys as a poor start was the catalyst for a strong finish which saw a tie breaking set required to determine who would go forward to represent Scotland, sadly it would not be us. The Masterteam would make up for the disappointment, as we had reached the Scottish Final for the second year in a row. A top two finish was needed in order to be one of Scotland's representatives in the UK final. I'm delighted to say we sealed a place in the UK Final with a first place in the Scottish Final, making the 128th the SCOTTISH CHAMPIONS, the first time we have been able to say that! In the UK final, with teams from Glasgow, Gourrock (both Scotland), Guildford, Gateshead (both England), Newton Abbey and Granshaw (both Northern Ireland), our boys got off to a great start, sitting first after round two, then sitting in second place for a long time before a race to the finish saw the '128th' finish in fourth place. A great achievement to have reached the final, and the hosts Wishaw Battalion (no exciting trips to another country!)

With no District Sports (Athletics) this year, we were able to join Partick District at their sports in Scotstoun which had been opened up to the Battalion (Glasgow wide). Despite the event being outdoor, or maybe that was why the boys ran so well in their endeavours to keep warm!, we would amass enough medals and points on the night to be crowned the unofficial Battalion champions, beating all of the Partick Companies.

Our Primary Seven boys had been preparing for their 'Compass Challenge', a competition to test the boys on what they had been learning in Drill, BB Knowledge and Christian Faith, for the third year in a row, gold medals would be brought back to Williamwood, with the 'A' team, and a special mention for the 'B' team, despite only having two boys in their team (teams could consist of three boys), they managed to secure silver medals, so a great achievement by both teams!

This year's Queen's Badge candidates, Stewart Cheng, Ian McDonach, Matthew Sproat, and Lewis Young are coming to the end of their work for the badge, and should be awarded their badges in the very near future (possibly before this article reaches your hands).

We've booked a weekend at Dalguise, Perthshire in June, so that the boys who wanted to go to a summer camp are able to have an alternative option.

It's been another busy session for the Company and Senior Sections, and as we prepare for the Display and end of session, we can and will look at this being yet another great year for the boys of the Company 😊

We are always keen to increase our numbers, so if you know of any boy (neighbour, son, grandson, nephew, friend, etc.,) who is/will be in Primary 7 or Secondary School after the summer, we'd be delighted to see him on a Friday night and a Sunday morning. Speak to myself, or please pass on one of our recruitment leaflets that are available in the Church.

We look forward to, and are extremely grateful for, the continued support of the congregation in the work of the Boys' Brigade in Williamwood Church.

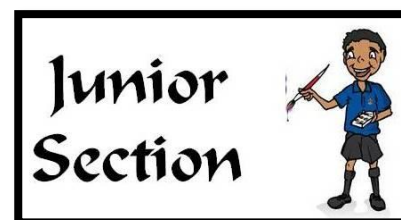

Christian Aid Week House-to-House Collection

It's that time of year again when volunteers are required for the "house-to-house" collection. It is increasingly difficult to find people who are willing and able to take on this task, which is not surprising as it is nobody's favourite job. At Williamwood we have been fortunate in having people who, over the years, have faithfully collected for this worthwhile cause. The B.B. boys have always posted the envelopes through the doors and later the collectors have knocked on these doors hoping for donations. This has become problematic since "NO COLD CALLING" notices have appeared and now, because of legislation, we are not allowed to knock on these doors.

It has been suggested we give up house-to-house collecting but it does raise a lot of money (although not as much as it used to) which would be difficult to get from any other fund raising effort.

To try and make things easier this year it has been decided that collectors will also post the envelopes into every door in the area they are covering but the following note will be posted with the envelope into the doors displaying a "no cold calling" notice:-

"Due to the fact that you are displaying a "no cold calling" notice we are unable to call back. Christian Aid works with people living in poverty regardless of religion, race or gender and funds projects that help people whatever their beliefs. If you wish to donate please send directly to the address on the envelope or drop your envelope off at Williamwood Church."

The collectors will then only need to return to the houses not displaying a notice. Hopefully this will reduce the pressure on the collectors. We will review the situation when we hear from the collectors and count the donations.

As you know there are some very steep areas in our parish which require those who are fit, able and perhaps own a pick axe and crampons! Think of it as a work out!

If you were at Church on Sunday 7 April you will have heard Val Brown's inspiring talk about the work of Christian Aid and the difference that is being made in the lives of the poor in many countries across the world. We can be (and have been) part of these changes.

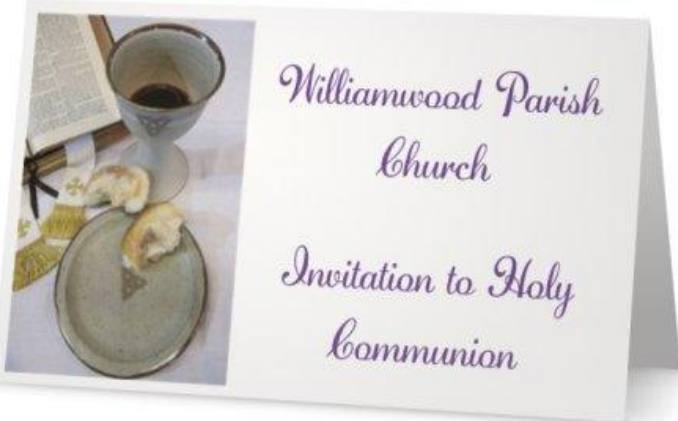
I have taken some photographs of the garden and will hopefully have something to display at the Showcase Event on Sunday 28th of April.
