From the Manse.....

Dear Friends,

The smallest unit of time ever measured is said to be 100 attoseconds: a billion, billionths of a second.

It felt as if it took not much longer than that, recently, for me to go from wheeling my bin along the path at the side of the manse to landing in a heap on the ground with the bin on top of me!

I'm hugely grateful that one of our young folk was passing a few seconds later and was able to rescue me – though I did end up spending the night in hospital: a first time for everything!

I have since been learning to walk again insofar as a sprained knee will allow – and now time seems much longer. *It'll just take time* people from health professionals to friends tell me as they watch me trying to use a walking stick.

I'm grateful to everyone for their help and good wishes and I'm pleased to say that I am, literally, getting back on my feet even if I often feel it's not quickly enough.

This enforced time when things have to be done at a slower pace, taking more time than usual, has made me think a bit about how we use time.

Often we are rushing around and we deprive ourselves of time for relaxation and of time spent with other people. Sometimes it is good to reflect on what is important and what other things can wait; good to distinguish between what we need to do and what other things cause unnecessary stress or anxiety.

As we approach Christmas time again, many folk find themselves under pressure – to put together the perfect Christmas; to cook the perfect turkey; to find the perfect presents; to be perfectly prepared and organised and as good or better than everyone else at producing the perfect Christmas 'experience'.

In the weeks leading up to Advent we're offering some relaxed sessions of *Alternativity* – discussions about doing Christmas differently and in a way that doesn't put us under pressure to spend money or to meet unrealistic expectations. Then in the weeks leading up to Christmas there will be the opportunity to engage in some Bible studies that help us delve into what happened in Bethlehem so long ago.

You can also sign up to receive daily Advent reflections from *Embrace the Middle East*: a time each day to set aside and take time out of the ordinary and of the extraordinary rush that Christmas preparations can become.

Of course, we have all the usual services and events of which you'll find details elsewhere in this magazine. We hope you will come along to as many of them as you can – and that you'll bring others with you.

It was at Christmas that God entered human time – and changed our times for ever. The present and the eternal became one and we begin to understand that we live our lives not just through a span of years but in the context of eternity as yet unfathomable to us.

My times are in thy hand, says a hymn that is less familiar these days than it deserves to be. It reminds us that throughout all time, no matter what may happen in it, we can rely utterly on our eternal and caring God whose Love came down at Christmas and is with us and for us always:

My times are in thy hand: My God, I wish them there; My life, my friends, my soul I leave Entirely to thy care

May you find time to discover the presence and the peace of God in your life now, in the coming weeks and always.



Williamwood Posada

The Posada which takes place during the days and weeks leading up to Christmas has become something of a Williamwood tradition.

This year our Posada will begin on Sunday 1st December when our wooden figures of Mary and Joseph



(crafted in Bethlehem) will leave the Church building and travel from house to house throughout our parish and beyond as they spend one night in the home of members of our congregation, or that of a neighbour or friend.

If you can post a picture of Mary and Joseph in your home on social media that would be great (and if you're not sure how to do this just take a picture and Sarah Alexander, our organist, will help you do the rest)

You might want to spend some time together as you pass the figures on enjoying mince pies and/or conversation and as there are prayers which accompany the figures there's an opportunity to pray together if you wish.

Mary and Joseph will end their journey on Christmas Eve when they come back to the Church and the stable there where, on Christmas morning, the baby Jesus will join them.

The Posada, or *Las Posadas*, originates from Spain and other Spanish speaking countries such as Mexico.

Posada means stopping place and between 16th and 24th December a procession of people, often led by a child will go to the houses of neighbours or friends asking to be let in. The people in the procession carry candles or lights and a figure of Mary and Joseph. Only at the third house each evening do they gain entry. When they go in there is great rejoicing and a time of worship. It's not difficult to see the echoes of the story of first Christmas in this tradition.

After the last Posada on 24th December everyone goes together to the service in the local Church.

It's a tradition that brings the community together and helps people prepare for and then celebrate Christmas.

Come along to Williamwood Church on one or all of the Sundays in Advent and join in our Posada, helping us to prepare to celebrate the great good news of Christmas: God with us.

SARAH ALEXANDER IN SOUTH KOREA

In August, I spent a full week in South Korea attending the Pilgrimage of Justice & Peace, where I spent time travelling with Christians from all around the world exploring areas of Seoul, Gwang-ju, Nogeun-ri & Paju. I had an amazing time learning about the Korean Peninsula, the history between North & South Korea, and why it is important for us to learn about peace issues in different parts of the world. I am very grateful to had had the opportunity to attend this Pilgrimage, as I made many friends along the way and we are still in touch today sharing our stories with one another through social media.

Having only been outside of the U.K once, I was surprised by how little I knew of the history of Korea. I look back now and realise the significance of the places we visited, and I find myself doing more research now to further my knowledge on what I learned on the trip. I went through a rollercoaster of emotions during the week, but every evening we were in small groups to have a reflection on what we visited during the day.

When I think back on the trip, I am glad that mainly happy memories spring to mind. It was difficult at times when learning about various massacres, uprisings & the way people were treated, because of the amount of people that suffered and died during these events. When we came together in worship, it made me think about how a group of people can be brought together through the love of God and prayer.

Our closing worship was a bitter-sweet experience. We all had an amazing last night the night before, and we had a beautiful morning service which closed with communion. In this case, the sharing of peace after taking the sacrament was also where we said our goodbyes to one another. It was definitely the longest communion I have ever experienced, but I was feeling very joyful and blessed to have had the

opportunity to spend one week with an amazing group of people.

128th Glasgow Company The Boys' Brigade Company & Senior Sections



Dear All,

Session 19/20 is well under way, and there have been a few changes to how we are operating. With our numbers lower than we want them to be, fifteen boys between the two sections, we have reviewed our programme and made a few adjustments. Our Friday night programme now incorporates a period of 'Reflections', a short period of time when the boys and officers sit together to listen and discuss a Bible passage, with prayer – this is replacing the traditional Sunday morning Bible Class on a trial period. There are only a handful of BB Companies within the Battalion still operating with a Sunday Bible Class, in what is challenging times for many BB Companies. In a positive side we are able to discuss and bring the Word to all of the boys, as we had been struggling to compete for their time on a Sunday morning. Our classes on Friday nights are worked around this, and as I type ahead of a Friday night, I know some boys will be enjoying take away pizza as they watch a film, others will be learning about CPR and others will be attempting to make their own ice cream!

Another change, after 14 years of running a mini bus, we have decided that we can no longer justify the expense of running a bus with all the costs that this incurs, and the big transit mini bus will be passed on to a new owner in the near future. A good number of people helped us financially and practically when we bought this bus, and we are extremely grateful for all the help and support that was shown when we purchased the bus, and in helping us maintain it over the years. Whatever price we are able to sell the bus for will, of course, go back into the 128 BB's funds.

The most important part of our work, is ensuring we are doing all we can to attract, entertain, educate and challenge the boys. We have a great group of boys, and we want the numbers to increase! If you have a chance to encourage a boy (directly, or through his parents) to come along, we are always happy to have them. We need everyone's help to increase our numbers (in all sections, from P1 to Secondary 6).

This session we will be participating in District, Battalion and National events and competitions, last session saw boys play badminton in Dundee and Inverness, and compete in a UK final against boys from Northern Ireland and England, great and memorable experiences. Following a great evening hosted by "Show Racism the Red Card" last session, we are looking at other options for this session as well as activities that will take us out of the Church Halls and see some us undertake new activities.

On the badge front, we will be helping and encouraging the boys to work through the various options, and look forward to (hopefully) presenting three Queen's Badges and two President's Badges later in the session to our older boys, and an array of badges through the younger ages.

Our Parents' Association are still to finalise the plans for our fundraising events, but on the agenda is the Christmas Hamper, which has been popular and very well supported for many years. A big thank you to all who have donated items for the hamper, and just as importantly, bought tickets over the years. Your support at this time of year is always appreciated.

We look forward to, and are extremely grateful for, the continued support of the congregation in the work of the Boys' Brigade in Williamwood Church.
