# "Preparing for Christmas - Preparing Our Hearts"

As I come to the close of my year serving among you here at Williamwood, my heart is full of gratitude. It has been a privilege to share worship, friendship, and faith together. We have journeyed through seasons of joy and sorrow, hope and uncertainty, and we have seen again how faithful God is in every circumstance. Now, as we stand on the threshold of Advent and look towards Christmas, I find myself reflecting on what it truly means to *prepare*.

We are all good at preparing in one way or another. Soon, kitchens will fill with the smell of mince pies and fruit cake; cards will be written; presents bought and wrapped; lights hung on trees. But amidst all the bustle, there's a quieter, deeper kind of preparation that the Bible invites us to — the preparation of the heart.

1. "Prepare the way of the Lord"

In the Gospel of Luke, we meet John the Baptist crying out in the wilderness,

"Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for Him." (Luke 3:4)

John's message was not about decorating or organising, but about *repentance* and *readiness*. He called people to clear away the clutter that blocked their relationship with God — pride, complacency, and indifference — so that when the Messiah came, they would be able to recognise Him and welcome Him in.

Perhaps that's still our calling today. As we prepare for Christmas, God asks us not only to tidy our homes, but to make space in our hearts — to clear the spiritual clutter that fills our minds and keeps us from peace. In the quiet moments of Advent, we can pause to ask: What paths in my life need straightening so that Christ may come nearer?

2. "Let every heart prepare Him room"

The carol *Joy to the World* puts it beautifully: "Let every heart prepare Him room." At Bethlehem, there was no room for Mary and Joseph — no space in the inn for the Saviour of the world. Yet God's Son came anyway, not to the palace or temple, but to a manger — humble, simple, poor.

This story tells us something vital about the heart of God. He does not wait for perfect circumstances or spotless people. He comes to the humble and willing heart — to anyone ready to receive Him. Christmas reminds us that God is not far off, but Emmanuel, *God with us* — here in our homes, our struggles, our ordinary days.

In my time with you at Williamwood, I have seen that truth lived out — in the warmth of fellowship after worship, in quiet pastoral visits, in moments of shared prayer and kindness. Christ comes wherever hearts make room for Him, and I have seen His presence here among you.

3. "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light"

The prophet Isaiah saw it long before that first Christmas:

"The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness, a light has dawned." (Isaiah 9:2)

Light and darkness are powerful Advent themes. For many, this season is not easy. Empty chairs remind us of loved ones who have gone. The days grow shorter, and worries often seem heavier. Yet it is precisely *into the darkness* that the light of Christ shines.

The message of Christmas is not escapism, but hope in the midst of reality. God steps into the world as it is — not as it should be — and brings light that no darkness can overcome. That's why we light candles each Sunday of Advent. Each flame is a small defiance against despair, a visible reminder that "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1:5)

If your own Advent feels shadowed this year, may you find comfort in knowing that God's light still shines. You are not forgotten, and you are not alone.

#### 4. "Do not be afraid"

Again and again in the Christmas story, the angel's message is the same: "Do not be afraid." To Mary, to Joseph, to the shepherds — each time, those words break through fear and uncertainty with reassurance and peace.

We live in a world where fear often dominates — fear of change, fear of the future, fear for loved ones, fear of conflict or loss. Yet God's word to us remains steady: "Do not be afraid, for I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people." (Luke 2:10)

That joy is not dependent on circumstance. It comes from knowing that in Christ, God has drawn near. Whatever lies ahead — for you, for me, for this congregation — we can move forward with courage, because the same God who came in Bethlehem still comes to us today, quietly but powerfully, in love.

### 5. "A Saviour has been born to you"

The Christmas message is profoundly personal. The angel said, "A Saviour has been born to you."

Not just *to the world*, but *to you* — to each of us. That's what transforms Christmas from a lovely story into a living faith. It is God's personal invitation: to receive His love, to trust His grace, and to walk in His peace.

As I reflect on this past year at Williamwood, I give thanks that together we have proclaimed that good news — in worship, in prayer, in our care for one another, and in our service to the wider community. You have been a light in this parish, pointing others to the hope of Christ. My prayer is that you will continue to shine that light long after I have moved on.

#### 6. "Glory to God in the highest"

In the end, Christmas is about glory — not ours, but God's. It is about wonder breaking into the ordinary, heaven touching earth, and grace reaching out to every person. The shepherds returned from Bethlehem "glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen." (Luke 2:20)

May that be our spirit too this Advent. As we prepare, as we wait, as we worship — may we do so with hearts full of gratitude and expectation. For Christ still comes, not only once in Bethlehem, but again and again into the lives of those who are ready to receive Him.

So, as we prepare for Christmas this year, let's prepare not just our homes but our hearts. Let's open ourselves afresh to the God who comes near, who brings light to our darkness, peace to our fears, and love without end.

And as I take my leave from this wonderful congregation, I want to say a heartfelt *thank you* — for your faithfulness, your welcome, and your partnership in the Gospel. May the Lord bless you and keep you in the year ahead. May He fill your hearts with hope, your homes with joy, and your lives with His light.

"The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14) Thanks be to God.
