

Dear Friends,

A new year has begun and now, a few weeks into it, we are, once more, in the middle of the awards season. The Golden Globes; the Television Awards and then the Oscars all take place, creating much excitement on red carpets in London and Los Angeles.

I haven't yet seen any of the films being tipped for a 'best picture' Oscar, though I hope to remedy that soon!

I have been struck, however, by how many of the films nominated for awards are stories – and stories of people at that.

There's the story of *Mary Queen of Scots* and the conflict with her cousin Elizabeth I of England; the story of another Queen, Anne and the trials of her life in *The Favourite*. *Green Book* tells the story of an unlikely friendship while *Bohemian Rhapsody* tells the story of the rock band Queen and *Roma* tells the story of apparently insignificant domestic workers from Mexico.

Stan and Ollie doesn't seem to have made it to the Oscar nominations but it tells the story of the entertainers whose lives as film stars was beyond anything they could ever have imagined.

We enjoy stories and they have an enduring quality. The best of them let us see something new about our world or ourselves, or they give us new insights, or teach us new truths.

Jesus was, of course, a supremely good story-teller and his parables are often about people: the good Samaritan; the lost son; the good shepherd; the sower.

These stories show us something about ourselves and they show us something of what God and God's kingdom is like. These stories have a 'twist' for they are not what we expect. It is a Samaritan who helps a man in need and this is deeply counter-cultural for the time. Samaritans and Jews would have had little, if anything, to do with each other; there was hostility between them and yet the Samaritan shows the kindness and love that is of God unlike the other well-regarded, seemingly important and godly people, who did nothing.

Throughout the Bible, in both the old and the new testaments, we have a wealth of stories – all part of the story of God and God's people: part of the great salvation story of our God. That story continues in our world and in our lives yet. We are part of the still unfolding story of God's saving goodness and grace. The 'old, old stories' can teach us what it is to be God's people today in the Church and in the world and can help us shape the new instalments of that story. These stories, within God's story, will still be concerned with the least of folk and those in need; they will be the stories of unlikely friendships of people who are sisters and brothers in Christ; they will be the unlikely stories of our own relationship with God and they will be about striving to resolve conflict; working for justice and establishing communities and connections. And this will be the great story of lives transformed beyond anything we can imagine by the grace of God revealed in Jesus Christ our Lord and known in the continuing activity of the Holy Spirit.

I'm delighted that, in our congregation, we are beginning a new initiative to tell the stories of the Bible to the very young. We're starting a Bible Story Time, once a month to begin with, for under 5s and their carers. They'll hear a Bible story, have a song and a play time and then they'll be able to take away a story bag with another story and a toy which they can enjoy at home. They bring the story-bag back the following month and get another bag in exchange.

I'm grateful to all who have helped with this by preparing the bags and assembling their contents and publicising it for us. Do encourage any under 5s you know to come along.

Lent, like Easter which follows it, is quite late this year but during Lent we hope to explore something of God's story through Bible discussion groups which we'll arrange in co-operation with other congregations in the Clarkston Churches Together grouping. We look forward to hearing the different understandings that folk have of the parts of God's story we'll consider together.

Then at Easter, 21st April, we'll celebrate the greatest of all stories: the resurrection of Jesus, the Christ who brings us all to new life with God.

We're planning to begin our Easter Day celebrations with an early service in Greenbank Garden followed by tea, coffee and breakfast rolls in Cathcart Castle Golf Club before coming to our Church building for a service of rejoicing. Do come and join us if you can.

Before that there is much else that is happening in our congregation's life. You'll find details elsewhere in this magazine; on the website and on intimation sheets each Sunday.

I encourage everyone to consider their 'starring role' in our congregation's story for it is by taking part and working together we build a strong community of faith which serves our parish and our world and which witnesses to the love and transforming power of God.

If you're not sure what's going on or want to find out more about how you can be part of some aspects of our fellowship then put a date in your diary to come along to our Showcase event, taking place after the service and Stated Annual Meeting on 24th March. We hope all the groups from our congregation and our hall users, too, will have displays for you to look at while enjoying a snack lunch and that there will be representatives from the groups to explain what they do and how you can join them.

As Christian folk we have a great story to share: the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. As the Church in this place let us continue to do so in ways old and new, *telling out the greatness of the Lord,* for we are each nominated and called by God to be actors for good in this world, playing our part in God's story of love and life.

128th Glasgow Company The Boys' Brigade Company & Senior Sections



Dear All,

It was with sadness that we learnt of the passing of our former BB officer, Mr Jack Robertson. Jack had been an active supporter of the BB as a parent and member of the Parents' Committee, before deciding to become an officer in the mid 1990s. He served in the Company and Senior Sections for many years, and even after 'retiring' from "active service" he continued to assist the '128' by looking after the minibus(es) and helping out in other ways. Many boys, and officers, will remember him fondly for his culinary skills (and his fondness of experimenting with left overs – hot dogs in the next day's soup, Freddos in the hot chocolate and plenty of pepper in just about everything else!) when he took on the role of camp cook. It goes without saying that Jack, Margaret and the Robertson family are in our prayers at this time.

The second half of our session is under way, and we are about to start a fresh batch of classes to keep the boys' interest on Friday nights. Or New Year (2019) started with a different type of night, when we welcomed Derek Ferguson (ex professional footballer, Rangers, Hearts, etc.,) and Dumie Matsebanane (originally from Zimbabwe), who were representing the organisation "Show Racism the Red Card" and spent the evening with us. As the name suggests, this organisation works to focus peoples' attention on racism, stereotypes, refugees, etc.,. Dumie spoke to us (all boys and officers) about the way we think, the way we judge people and then went on to tell us his story and how he had to flee his home country because he would not comply with the rules of that society. Derek explained how he had witnessed, first hand, the abuse that a fellow footballer was subjected to and felt compelled to act against it. Derek then took the boys for a training / PE class to finish the evening. It was a very informative and interesting evening, enjoyed by all, and our guests commented on how well the boys had participated in the discussions. Thanks go to Ruth McGeoch (Moira's daughter) for offering to arrange this for us.

We are always open to new ideas / suggestions / offers for classes and activities, and if you feel you can help, or know someone who can / will, then please get in touch.

Our Queen's Badge candidates; Stewart Cheng, Ian McDonach, Matthew Sproat, and Lewis Young are coming to the end of their work for the badge, and will be heading to the Battalion run completion course in March. We are also pleased to have another three starting out on their Queen's Badge work; Euan Coyle, Keir Hird and Callum McKenzie all receiving their President's Badges in the month of January.

At the other end of the age groups, our Primary Seven boys are working in preparation for the "Compass Challenge" competition in February.

In the District events, we won the Company Section Quiz night.

In Battalion competitions, we have brought home several medals for Badminton (singles), as well as individual and team medals / trophy in Cross Country, indeed every '128' boy who took part in this year's Battalion Cross Country, not only came home with a medal, but has also been invited to represent Glasgow Battalion in the Scottish event. The roll of honour is on display in the large hall.

In the National Competitions, it is always pleasing if we are able to say we are still involved after the Christmas break in the "Nationals", and our Badminton (A) team are through to the last eight of the Scottish heats, and our Chess team are through to the last four ③. Our Masterteam (Quiz) have reached the Scottish Final, for the second year in a row, and this will take place in Gourock in February {a win, or runners up spot in this final would see the boys head to the UK final representing their country, so we are working towards that}.

Unfortunately, our proposed summer camp will not be going ahead, due to low numbers. However, we will now look to arrange a weekend event in Mid June to ensure the boys who wanted a camp, and hopefully a good number of other boys will experience the fellowship that goes with a longer event.

We look forward to, and are extremely grateful for, the continued support of the congregation in the work of the Boys' Brigade in Williamwood Church.

We are still keen to increase our numbers, so if you know of any boy (neighbour, son, grandson, nephew, friend, etc.,) who is in Primary 7 or Secondary School, we'd be delighted to see him on a Friday night and a Sunday morning. Sylvia Jenks told us about the Whithorn Pilgrimage.


Graham Greenhalgh's subject was about nursery rhymes and the hidden meanings behind some of them.

MEARNSKIRK HOSPITAL MEMORIES

Mearnskirk Hospital was located in open countryside and opened as a children's TB hospital in 1930. It subsequently became a general hospital and at its peak had more than 500 beds.

Services led by churches were begun in 1933 by the then minister of Newton Mearns Parish Church along with Mr James Rodger of Maple Evangelical Church.






Stamperland Church's involvement with the hospital began in 1958 when 2 members of the congregation joined in the services, then the church became more fully involved in 1960 conducting short services in a number of wards every Sunday.

Mr Rodger continued as leader for 40 years until just before his death in 1975 when Mr Alex Muirhead of Victoria Hall succeeded him as leader until he retired in 1981. At that time the late Jack Fraser of Stamperland took over as leader.

Many local churches readily joined the rota over the years to regularly lead services Sunday by Sunday, some also being similarly involved at Infirmary. the Victoria Several churches such as Clarkston Baptist, Church, Kingspark Greenbank Baptist, Newlands South, Newton Hall, Mearns, Victoria Maxwell Mearns, Mearns Parish, Giffnock Park and Crosshill Queens Park played their part but later dropped out.





The hospital closed in the 1980's with the exception of two wings at Mearnskirk House which continued as a long term care unit. Services though never ceased and continued at Mearnskirk House up to the present day, Sadly this much needed facility is due to close shortly and so all the church's involvement will now cease.




